# GPO: THENEWSEA INTEGSUIT

The role of Chief Pigrizia Officer has arrived - and isn't going anywhere in a hurry. We sit down with Sara Sonnellino, CPO at Milan-based consultancy Disteso, to find out why.



# What is a CPO?

Simply put, I'm the one to make sure we're pigra all the way up, from the mailroom to the C-suite I firmly believe that for a long time we've had the wrong idea about what we call the workplace. This first part, work – yes, ok, that's clear. But place means a fixed position, something in a resting state. We tend to focus on the first part of the word and ignore the second. It's my job to change that.

### When did you know that being a **CPO** was your calling?

To be honest I was such a hard worker for so long sometimes I'm amazed that I ever came around to the whole concept of pigra at all. But one day it hit me: what if we actually did work a lot less? I was like St. Paul on the road to Damascus, or maybe like St. Paul taking a break on the side of the road to Damascus. Anyway, in a flash, I was converted. I put my head down on my desk, suddenly exhausted, and when I woke up a few hours later to the sound of the cleaning staff running the vacuums after hours I realized my whole working life was about to change.

# Who inspires you in your work

Whenever I'm lacking inspiration I like to look to the great inventors. The computer? The skyscraper? The sandwich? Whoever invented them were certainly a lazy bunch. And I recommend reading Giorgio Buonanotte [see page 16 for the Gazette interview] for anybody who's thinking one day about maybe implementing pigra-forward policies in their workplace, with or without a CPO.

### What pigra-forward changes have you implemented at Disteso? We've installed coffee machines at the end of every row of desks,

which means nobody has to walk

kitchen somewhere. Yes, coffee gets passed from hand to hand down the row, but there are fewer spills than you'd think, and nobody has to get up. There are Bernacles no more than 10 meters from every line. These are small purpose-built cubicles we have for napping where you sort of cling to a comforting object, like a teddy bear, or your mother's tattered robe. They're inspired by Dr. Buonanotte's work on the subject but also the sleeper's resemblance in this pod to a barnacle just sort of lazily clinging. And since stand-up desks and treadmill desks are finally recognized for the sheer folly they are, we're piloting divan-desks which allow you to lie on one side and type with the help of an arm rest.

### How does your work impact women in the workplace?

I think there's a huge impact. For decades we've been fighting to prove that we can sacrifice everything, like a man, for our careers. Lean in, said Sheryl Sandberg. Instead, I say Lean back. That goes for everybody, women and men. Parental leave for all, unlimited vacation for all, Bernacles for all. It's not about women getting ahead, but about everyone getting purposefully behind.

### What can we expect in the future from workplace pigrizia?

Well, the most obvious advancement has been staring at us in the face for the past few years now: voice interface. No more keyboards, no more energy-wasting key tapping. You know we've got this expression in Italian: tra dire e fare c'è in mezzo il mare, which means there's a gulf as big as the sea between saying something and actually doing it. But with voice interface we're going to eliminate that gulf: saying it will be doing it. And then we can also get rid of that silly saying which always seemed to have too many words to me anyway. Expect other changes, too: more remote working, for example,

Any advice to HR on hiring for a

# **CPO** position? The first thing any HR team has t

be aware of is that the CPO should be an embodiment of the kind of culture they wish to instill. The candidate should be *molto pigra* at minimum so you may find that the CV has typos, is addressed to the wrong company (a lazy copyand-paste job, surely), and the cover letter may simply repeat everything in the CV. I know it goes against every article ever published on Monster about how to get a job but in this case it's ok. In the interview, look for air quotes whenever they talk about work. Not work, but "work." That way you can tell they're going to take their "job" "seriously.

### There has been a proliferation of C-suite roles in recent decades. Is CPO here to stay?

I know what you mean: Chief Fun Officer, Chief Storyteller, Chief Ninja. Some of these are sillier than others, some come and go. Now Chief Pigrizia Officer has finally arrived – and isn't going anywhere







# THERE'S SOMETHING IN THE WATER

Interview with Beppe Sodo, 3rd generation owner of Pigra's Caffé Cista', on the secret of the perfect coffee.

Pigra – There is no more necessary time to meet a cafe owner, in a cafe, for a caffé, than 6:30 am, and that's exactly when Giuseppe Sodo, 3rd generation owner of Pigra's Caffé Cista' (pronounced chee-sta in Italian), suggested we meet. The winner of Italy's Tazza d'Argento assured me it was the only time that he could spare a few minutes to chat. Beppe himself made me the most exquisite, perfectly-balanced espresso I've ever tasted, while I tried to find out what

How did you get your start? I was practically raised behind this bar. My first job for my father was cleaning the espresso machines, just like he did for my grandfather. With small hands, it's easier.

How have things changed since

My hands have gotten bigger, for one! We've also replaced the machines and added additional ones as well. Customers are more informed these days, and more particular about their tastes. We make sure we can give them what

Today people want soy milk, ginseng, decaf and barley coffee. Are these really part of the coffee experience?

Myself, I'm a purist. I've got a definite idea of what coffee should be. But I'm just one customer here. Our job is to help everyone find that brief moment of peace and relaxation with the drink that they

But wasn't it your purism that won you the Tazza d'Argento? You'd have to ask the judges!

people, mostly Italians. But the number of foreigners on holiday has been climbing like crazy for years. The season used to finish at the beginning of September and not pick up again until around Christmas. Now, as they say in Italian, non ci sono più le mezze stagioni. There are no in-between seasons. The season is all year

Now, let's get serious. What's the secret to the perfect coffee? It's part head, part hands, part attitude. And partly something else.

What do you mean?

You've got you know about beans, understand what coffee is about. That's head. Then you've got to know how to work the machines, the tools, fast and efficiently, without thinking about it. That's hands

# And attitude? You've got to know your customers. Tourists are here for a real Pigra holiday, to relax. The regulars come when their day is just starting, or ending. They're wornout. Even vulnerable. They're not just ordering something to drink, they're asking you for the permis

# The what, how and when of (near) immobility

Mobility has a lot of perks, but immobility does too. But what about very slow movement? In the UK, slow, casual, unpredictable movement is at the centre of a peculiar sporting event: Lazy Snail Race.

Ready, Steady, Slow Forget all the training. Here, the contestants aren't forced to move at all if they don't want to. And in fact many do not. As the race starts each summer in the English village of Congham, after the ceremonial encouragement of "Ready, steady, slow!" most of the competitors remain stuck at the start line. Only some of them, pepped by the noise, or perhaps looking for a snack, start meandering, slowly and lazily, across the sundial. The fastest snail this year won the title crossing three

concentric circles 33 cm in radius in just over 3 minutes. But some of its teammates – over 150 snails competed in total – did not move at all during that time.

Win or be squashed This is fully acceptable behaviour,

even if the one in Congham is actually the official world snail racing championship and things are taken quite seriously. The competition has been held for a half a century, since the 1960s, and the "sport" has refined with time. Snail racer John McClean revealed that "We've got training slopes. We look at diet, we are drug compliant as well. It's the whole thing when you look at elite sports." The selection of the teams is less stringent, however: people (team sponsors, if you will)

can select a snail from a bucket or






# Why it's time to wake up to the issue of office sleep

Sleepers are not welcome in the office, but power naps increase productivity. An interview with Milanese industrial psychologist Giorgio Buonanotte.

Mr. Buonanotte, you're fighting for more tolerance toward sleeping in the office.



Yes, there is still a lot of resistance. The boundaries between work and private life are becoming increasingly blurred, yet work and sleep are still considered contradictions. We have to learn to deal with this issue without prejudice.

Because everyone would benefit. Napping in the office is a classic Stress hormones decrease, while effectiveness and motivation increase. Despite this clear fact, we are not able to change the practice. On this issue, the public sector seems to be ahead of the private sector for once.

# How can sleeping be integrated into everyday office life?

A nap shouldn't last longer than 20 minutes – 12 minutes is ideal, according to experts. Set yourself an alarm, or better yet, hold a bunch of keys in your hand. When deep sleep is about to set in, your muscles relax and the keys will fall

# Your colleagues will notice that.

Usually not, but you do address an important point: there's a real lack of solidarity and social acceptance. The office sleeper lives in constant fear of discovery. This fear makes them ill, which means downtime and costs for companies. But it also leads people to search for creative solutions. It's amazing

what people come up with to help them fall asleep for a moment.


You mean, for example, the classic mountain of files for privacy? This is becoming increasingly rare. With digitalization, the mountain of files – the natural habitat for the office sleeper - is slowly disappearing. This further exacerbates the situation for those affected. But basically, it's enough if you simply rest your head in one hand, look down at a piece of paper and close your eyes. It's important that the paper is written on and that you turn the page at every 10 minutes at the latest. Again, this is where the key trick helps.

### But what if the light disturbs you? It's best for light-sensitive sleepers to retreat briefly under the desk. However, this method is rather unsuitable for open-plan offices.

What do you recommend? If you sit with your back to your colleagues, take one of the few files left in the office and clamp it under your chin. In this way you can adopt the normal working posture and still sleep.

# What other solutions do you know

from your practice? In many companies, the toilet serves as a place of retreat. The toilet roll can be used as a neck support. However, this only goes to show how much those affected



What do we have to change? We have to stop being secretive and should start by creating socially acceptable free spaces in which employees can simply slumber away. Estimates assume productivity gains of up to 5%. It's free of charge,

ecological and sustainable. Everyone is talking about industry 4.0, but what we need is a sleeping office 2.0. It's time for those responsible, well, to wake up.
